
Walk, Ride or Scoot to Schooll









Acknowledgement of Country

The handmade string is used to make baskets, fishing nets and jewellery. We sat in a yarning circle and all had a go. Almost everyone got the hang of it and some beautiful necklaces and bracelets were created. We all had so much fun.

Outdoor Education Studies Camp – Federation Hut

Late in Term 3 the Year 11 OES class undertook an overnight snow camp experience at Federation Hut with is just below Victoria's second highest mountain, Mount Feathertop. To begin the camp, students had to hike uphill for 10km with all their gear and snowshoes along Bungalow Spur. This was a fair challenge in itself. It took a good 3-4 hours to make it to the final destination which was Federation Hut. The weather

was not on our side so we needed to get up as quick as possible to beat the rain which was coming in sideways as we arrived. Students had to work together when there was a





break in the weather to set up their tents in the snow, which was a first for all of them. We were lucky to have the hut to provide shelter and warmth as the weather was really coming in with very strong wind and overnight was significant snow fall, about 30cm of fresh snow by the time we woke up. The students got to appreciate how conditions can be so harsh and extreme in these environments and how the need for appropriate gear and knowledge is important when travelling in this type of environment.







All the students enjoyed a nice snow shoe on the way back down Bungalow Spur, due to the fresh snow overnight, students were able to travel for a few kms through the snow before we hit the snowline again and had to take the snowshoes off. This was truly a unique opportunity for many of the students who have never been in this situation before.

Over the last 3 years, our L2P program has faced some challenges, from bushfires to a pandemic, causing a suspension of the program, retirement of mentors and learners found other ways to get their hours.

In the past 6 months, Alpine L2P have focused on increasing our mentor numbers across the Shire, so we can support more youth the get their P plates. That focus has paid off and we now have 10 additional mentors, so we are now looking for learners.

So, if you are having trouble getting your 120 hours and need some assistance, this is the program for you. There is eligibility requirements but we look at each learner on an individual basis, so just ask.
